

Sunday of the Passion

Today, we encounter the paradox that defines our faith: Jesus Christ is glorified king and humiliated servant. We too are full of paradox: like Peter, we fervently desire to follow Christ, but find ourselves afraid, denying God. We wave palms in celebration today as Christ comes into our midst, and we follow with trepidation as his path leads to death on the cross. Amid it all we are invited into this paradoxical promise of life through Christ's broken body and outpoured love in a meal of bread and wine. We begin this week that stands at the center of the church year, anticipating the completion of God's astounding work.

*The worshipers gather outside on the driveway near the narthex entrance. Each worshiper has a palm branch or musical instrument, The cross focuses the people as the presider begins the worship. **The presider calls out to the assembly three times...each successive time louder and stronger.***

PROCESSIONAL GOSPEL

Matthew 21:1-11

When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, ²saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. ³If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." ⁴This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying,

⁵"Tell the daughter of Zion,
Look, your king is coming to you,
humble, and mounted on a donkey,
and on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

⁶The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; ⁷they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. ⁸A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. ⁹The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

"Hosanna to the Son of David!
Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!
Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

one God, now and forever. **Amen.**



Philippians 2:5-11

Paul uses an early Christian hymn to help us comprehend Jesus' obedient selflessness on the cross and how God has made Christ lord over all reality. The perspective of the cross becomes the way we rightly understand God, Christ, our own lives, and fellowship within the community of Christ.

A reading from Paul's letter to the people of Philippi.

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,

⁶who, though he was in the form of God,

did not regard equality with God

as something to be exploited,

⁷but emptied himself,

taking the form of a slave,

being born in human likeness.

And being found in human form,

⁸he humbled himself

and became obedient to the point of death—

even death on a cross.

HOLY WEEK SCHEDULE

Maundy Thursday, April 6, 2023 at 7 pm in the sanctuary and on livestream

The Great Three Day observance of Christ Jesus' death and resurrection begins this night with absolution from sin as our Lenten journey concludes. We'll celebrate the Lord's Supper remembering Christ's Last supper with his disciples, and remember Jesus' new commandment to them (and to us) to love one another as he washed their feet. As the service concludes, the altar is laid bare in anticipation of Good Friday observances.

Good Friday, April 7, 2023 at 7 pm in the sanctuary and on livestream

This quiet, reflective and prayerful service features the passion reading from John, and a reflection on Jesus' life and death. It finishes in the darkness with adoration of the crucified as we celebrate the triumph of the cross. We light candles, pray in the darkness, and depart in silence.

Easter Vigil, April 8, 2023 at 7 pm begins in the courtyard off the narthex

This is the night of salvation! At the Vigil of Easter, we gather around fire, word, water, bread, and wine, proclaiming through story and song that ours is a God who continuously brings life out of death. On this night we experience again the heart of God's baptismal promise and the center of our faith: we are claimed and cleansed, renewed in the death and resurrection of Christ.

Easter Sunday, April 9, 2023 at 10 am in the sanctuary and on livestream

This is the day the Lord has made! Christ is risen, and through him all creation is made new! We sing hymns of praise, gather around sacred words, and proclaim God's faithfulness, power, and love in the feast of holy communion. With the women at the tomb, we are astonished, elated, and grateful.
